COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course offers an opportunity to explore the history of the Christian Church from its origins in Judaism through to its monastic expansion beyond the boundaries of the Western Roman Empire in the sixth and seventh centuries. It will examine the conflicts, individuals, social movements and theologies that shaped Christianity during this formative period.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

To synthesize an historical perspective on the primary themes, figures and events in Early Christianity; to teach an understanding of how to read, interpret and analyze primary and secondary sources relating to Early Christianity; to learn to write a historical, analytical and argumentative paper relating to themes and topics in Early Christianity.
